

CELEBRATING 70 YEARS OF FAITH AND SERVICE

Preparations are afoot across all the parishes to celebrate the Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth in early June. No British monarch has been on the throne for 70 years. It's an historic moment. Let's hope for fine weather and wonderful and joyful events that our communities can all look back on, giving us many happy memories.

The concept of a Jubilee comes from the Bible. In the Old Testament it was intended to be a year when there was a kind of re-balancing of society, recognising the tendency in all societies for inequalities and injustices to become increasingly entrenched over time.

Jesus announced the beginning of his ministry using language associated with the Jubilee year (Luke 4: 18, 19), saying his mission was to bring good news for the poor, to bring sight to the blind, to free prisoners and release the oppressed, to deliver blessing.

The Queen herself has said, I look forward to continuing to serve you with all my heart. I hope this Jubilee will bring together families and friends, neighbours and communities – after some difficult times for so many of us.

As we give thanks for all the ways in which the Queen has sought to set an example of service to our people over 70 years, there can be no better way to celebrate this historic occasion than by reaching out to one another with a renewed commitment to serving others, and working for justice, healing and blessing for all people.

To quote Queen Elizabeth as she refers to the inspiration she has drawn from the example of Jesus:

At the heart of our faith stand not a preoccupation with our welfare and comfort but the concepts of service and of sacrifice as shown in the life and teachings of the one who made himself nothing, taking the very form of a servant.

We can't quite believe that there is only one more half term left of this academic year! In the meantime, we have lots of wonderful learning to tell you about!

Reading – and reading for pleasure – is something that we all enjoy at Hallbankgate Village School and we have been very fortunate to have visited the library in the Hub on a weekly basis since January. Having helped all children sign up for a Cumbria County Council library card, we are really enjoying visiting the library, borrowing books and reading them with our families: we are also really enjoying meeting people in our community again after all of the COVID-19 restrictions. We'd like to say **thank you** to Peter Lloyd who has been reading us stories on some of our visits, too, as well as all of the staff and volunteers in the Hub, for making us so welcome- we all look forward to our visits!

We've been on a number of educational visits so far in 2022, with lots more planned for the remainder of this academic year. To support our history learning in Class 1, we visited Carlisle Castle, Tullie House and the statue of Queen Victoria in Bitts Park, as well as Carlisle Cathedral to support our RE learning. It was very exciting to travel into Carlisle on a bus and walk through the city centre- our teachers were very impressed at how well we represented our school, too. In Class 2, we have explored the history of Hallbankgate and the surrounding area as part of our learning about the Industrial Revolution: we were fascinated by how the Hub has changed over the years and where the railway line used to be. We've also been to Maryport Aquarium to support our geography learning about the Great Barrier Reef and to the RNLI to support our PSHE learning. In Class 3, we are learning all about the major religions around the world in RE and have visited Farlam Church, Newcastle Central Mosque and Newcastle Sikh Gurdwara: it was fascinating to visit each of these places of worship and it really brought our RE learning to life. To support our learning about World War 2, we had a brilliant visit to the Victoria Tunnels in Newcastle and have an immersive visit to Eden Camp in North Yorkshire coming up, which will allow us to step back in time- we are even dressing up in clothes from the era! We are also looking forward to lots more exciting learning events this term, including the Class 3 residential visit to Scotland and our annual sports day! We are all enjoying getting back to a more normal school year after the last couple of years.

We have all enjoyed learning about the Queen and her Platinum Jubilee, this term, too. Ready for the village celebrations, we painted portraits of the Queen and wrote poems to celebrate this special occasion. We all enjoyed a special Jubilee lunch at the end of term - complete with red, white and blue clothing, bunting and crowns – before welcoming parents into our school to celebrate all of our wonderful learning.

As well as all of these wonderful learning opportunities, we are continuing to develop our school buildings and grounds. This term, we have had some new signs installed at the front of the building and have used our weekly wellbeing gardening lessons to plan and design what we would like, before working together to sow, grow, weed and water! Year 6 children made an excellent job of planting up the new pots on the railings at the front of school and Class 2 and 3 worked together to plant out the sunflowers that Class 1 grew- we hope that they will make the entrance to the village and our school nice and bright, as well as attract lots of wildlife! We've also been growing lots of fruit and vegetables in our vegetable garden and have discovered lots of frogs, frogspawn and even a newt in our school pond!

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



A SHORT HISTORY OF SOLWAY AVIATION MUSEUM

The Society was formed in 1961, and started to slowly acquire aircraft which were opened to the public. A Portacabin was donated and a small museum began. The Museum was officially opened in 1988, but has grown and developed over the years, and is now housed in two buildings, with an exterior display of aircraft. The collection has grown to 17 aircraft, some of the smaller ones are housed in our Aircraft Restoration workshop.

Our star attraction is our Avro Vulcan aircraft XJ823, which was purchased from the RAF and flew into Carlisle Airport in January 1983. Until the Covid pandemic, a cockpit tour inside the aircraft and two other aircraft were included in your admission fee. Re-opening the aircraft will be reviewed this year.

The Museum has six display areas. The first records the history of the wartime airfields in Cumbria, we also

have an engine room. The Spadeadam Room, tells the history of Blue Streak and the British Rocket Establishment which was based at what is now RAF Spadeadam. We cover the development of aviation communications as well as survival equipment, uniform displays, model aircraft, The Royal Observer Corps, and RAF Carlisle 14MU Maintenance Unit. One of our newer exhibits is a replica of a Lancaster Bomber's wireless operator's station, in our Lancaster Room.

Each year a special themed display is created, so there is always something new to see. This year we Commemorates the 40th Anniversary of the Falklands War with personal recollections of some of the

Anniversary of the Falklands War with personal recollections of some of those who took part. With unique images and memorabilia. We also have some guest speakers during May and June giving us accounts of there part during the aviation operations. Further details from the museum.

The Museum is a Registered Charity run entirely by unpaid volunteers and is open from the 1st April until the end of October 2022, on Fridays, Saturdays, Sundays and English Bank Holiday Mondays, from 10.30am until 5pm, with last admission 4.15pm.

Lynne McKenzie from Farlam is a member of the Farlam Church Restoration Group which has been fundraising for repairs at Farlam Church and organising contractors to refurbish the church roof, the heating and electrics as well as restoration of the bell tower and the provision of new carpeting and a new vestry door.

Lynne is an accomplished needleworker and developed an interest in church alter cloths following the visit of a conservation specialist who gave advice on how to maintain and repair aspects of the church building and its contents.

During this visit the church alter cloths were brought out and examined and advice given on cleaning them. This episode sparked an interest in alter cloths and a couple of years later Lynne made a new purple altar cloth to be used during Advent and Lent at Farlam Church. The gold work embroidery on this cloth was embroidered by machine but the other needlework is done by hand and takes many hours.

While the alter cloths were removed from storage during the conservation visit Lynne noticed that the white alter cloth was unravelling and generally in need of restoration. Lynne carried out some temporary repairs to the stitching and resolved to try and repair it at a later date.



Starting an alter cloth from scratch is challenging enough: restoring the work of other needle workers, carried out many years ago, requires a different and elevated level of embroidery skills involving the ability to recognise and replicate unfamiliar stitch patterns and the use of different types of threads, including silks and gold.

Lynne sought help from Sarah Dennis a graduate of the Royal School of Needlework a renowned embroidery tutor who has taught at the Victoria and Albert Albert Museum. Sara may be familiar to you as the textile expert on The Repair Workshop programme on BBC television. Lynne travels down to Lancaster Castle twice a month taking the alter cloth with her to Sarah's workshop and is learning how to carry out extensive restoration work on historic embroideries.

Underpinning this is the need for a wider knowledge of fabrics, how they age, deteriorate and lose colour and how best to repair and restore, while conserving but not eclipsing the work of a previous generation of needle workers. The fabric of the white alter cloth is disintegrating and Lynne has learned how to map the designs of the alter cloth and transfer these onto new silk fabric.



She is currently cutting the existing designs out of the alter cloth and will attach these onto the new silk backing cloth. The goldwork on the alter cloth is also unravelling and will need to be removed carefully and re-stitched onto the new cloth.

The Festival of Nature takes place at Talkin Tarn, Tarn Road, Brampton CA8 1HN on Saturday 18 June from 12 noon to 11.30pm and on Sunday 19 June from 7am to 4pm. Entry is free.

The Small Grants Fund welcomes applications for up to £1,000 whilst the Community Fund offers grants over £1,000 but not exceeding £10,000. For both funds up to 80% of the total costs can be applied for, and the remaining 20% can be made up of match funding, cash contributions, volunteer time, or a combination of all three. Everyone is welcome from throughout the Parish and beyond and is invited to make this a very special and memorable day for us all.





